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## AN INDISPENSIBLE PERSON RETIRES

“You have reached the Anglican Fellowship of Prayer...”

Thus begins Mary Hilton’s friendly Southern drawl message from her office when she is unavailable to answer the phone. Those who have heard it immediately recognize her voice.

For almost 22 years Mary has been in the office at our headquarters answering the phone and helping to guide AFP as its Executive Secretary, working closely with the board presidents, the Rt. Rev. Donald Hultstrand and Dr. William C. Williams and each Executive Director, first Mr. Harry Griffith followed by the Rt. Rev. Reginald Hollis, the Rev. Albert Lott and the Rev. Carlotta Cochrane.

She managed the AFP Bookshelf, keeping it supplied with current and meaningful titles and filling countless book orders. Along with the executive director, board members and president Mary was instrumental in planning and overseeing the International Conferences and the Biblical Institute. She managed the financial part of the ministry, receiving and recording all donations and book sales as well as paying the bills and filing the required governmental financial forms. Mary was constantly encouraging the diocesan representatives and volunteers across the country in their work, and she also had responsibility for some of the work of the International AFP along with our AFP brothers and sisters in Canada, the Bahamas and Bermuda.

Setting up and managing the colorful and appealing AFP booths for conferences and workshops for other organizations as well (e.g. the Daughters of the King, General Convention, other diocesan councils) is no small undertaking. Recently Mary drove her book loaded car from Florida to Columbus, Ohio to set up and manage the AFP booth at General Convention, and then drove home alone on the return trip—no mean feat. In addition she often hosted the annual board meeting of the AFP Council where her gift of hospitality and prowess in cooking made everyone feel relaxed and at home. Things which would normally upset the average person were taken care of with what appeared to be relative ease. Her friendly voice and manner was known to hundreds from bishops to novice D.R.’s, most of whom Mary knew well.

Mary not only helped line up leaders for conferences and workshops, she also led workshops herself, and this past year served as interim Executive Director of the AFP. Sometimes it seemed her entire 12 hour workday (aside from time for her grandchildren) was taken up with AFP work. Her husband, Bob, greatly supported Mary with his wise counsel and experienced computer know how, and was an invaluable aid to the work of the AFP.

A large part of the fine reputation of the Anglican Fellowship of Prayer is due to the love Mary has for the ministry and her dedicated hard work. It is with much reluctance that the US Council releases Mary, but we are thankful that she will still be available to us in a limited capacity from her home in South Carolina where she and Bob will be closer to her mother, children and grandchildren.

We will all miss you, Mary. We wish you Godspeed!

Dear Friends,

Most of the seasons of the Church Year do not last very long. The four weeks of Advent are followed by the twelve days of Christmas. Then come the varying weeks of Epiphany (up to nine depending on the date of Easter) followed by the forty days of Lenten season which is ushered in by Mardi Gras and Ash Wednesday culminating in Holy Week and Easter. Fifty days after Easter comes Pentecost. The Pentecost season comprising part of Spring, all of Summer and part of Fall is the longest season of the Church Year and lasts until Advent, thus completing the Church Year.

During the summer months churches experience their ups and downs, i.e., a lot of the congregation is either up at the mountains or down at the river, lake or beach in somewhat of a relaxed mode. I think during the summer part of Pentecost would be a good time to adjust our prayer life. Think of it as relaxing with God and changing our prayers from those of asking to include more of listening. Dallas Willard, whom some of you might remember was our speaker at an AFP International Conference, in his book, *Hearing God*, and Chuck Swindall, in his book, *The Mystery of God's Will* both write about how important it is to listen to God in order to learn what His will is for our lives.

Frankly, I'm not a very good listener. It is so easy for me to rush through the Adoration, Confession, and Thanksgiving part of my prayers (though I think I am taking a long time) to get to the Petitions and Supplications. When I think back on it I realize that I make my petitions and supplications the longest part of my prayers without much time listening to God.

The Collect for the 6<sup>th</sup> Sunday after Pentecost begins with the line, "Almighty God, the fountain of all wisdom, who knowest our necessities before we ask and our ignorance in asking..." tells me that I don't need to spend as much time as I do asking (telling?) God to do this or to do that. As Herbert O'Driscoll writes in *Prayers for the Breaking of Bread*, "when we kneel before God in prayer He already knows the totality of our being at that moment. He knows the totality of choices, chances, thoughts, actions, hopes, fears, and desires leading up to that moment. (Read this also in Psalm 139.) However, God's knowing what will be does not mean that he has already fixed what will be. The total context of life is hidden from us. We only know what has happened and what is happening at that moment, so we really don't know what to pray for, but we do pray because God wants us to pray and our Lord prayed and taught us to pray, and the Spirit intercedes for us (Romans 8: 26-27). Thus it is essential that we listen to God just as much as if not more than we talk to God. We know that God reaches us through other means as well, but listening is one vital way for us to hear Him.

I know the AFP Council members will be listening to God with increased interest as we move into our new duties of guiding AFP without the full time assistance of Mary Hilton, a daunting task to take care of so many things which we have so long taken for granted that Mary would take care of. God bless you, Mary, and thank you for all of the many years and love you have devoted to the Anglican Fellowship of Prayer. Please keep the AFP Council in your prayers.

## Lectio Divina, Praying The Scriptures

The Anglican Fellowship of Prayer will host the Fall Biblical Institute at ToddHall, an Episcopal Retreat and Conference Center, Columbia, IL (near St. Louis) on October 6 - 7, 2006. Once again we have an excellent speaker, the Reverend Brendan Moss, O. S. B., a Benedictine Monk of Saint Meinrad Archabbey (Roman Catholic), Saint Meinrad, IN. Father Moss will give four talks on *Lectio Divina, Praying the Scriptures*. Fr. Moss has just completed his Doctor of Ministry work in Homiletics at Aquinas Institute in St. Louis.

Lodging and meals at ToddHall Retreat and Conference Center are included in the price of registration. ToddHall is located in the scenic autumn hills overlooking Columbia, IL, ten miles south of St. Louis and only 45 minutes from the airport. See the website at [www.toddhallrc.org](http://www.toddhallrc.org) for precise directions. Freeways I-55, I-70 and I-255 provide easy access to State Highways 3 and 158. (ToddHall is accessed from State Highway 158). Meandering paths, wilderness trails, flowering gardens, outdoor Stations of the Cross and a meditative labyrinth are some of the amenities of this peaceful sanctuary. The St. Cecilia's Chapel has a wood accented interior with stained glass windows and a magnificent Wicks Pipe Organ. It is an inviting place for meditation, contemplation and worship.

We will begin Friday night with a welcome and Evening Prayer at 7:00 pm followed by Father Moss's first address. Saturday will include three meditations by Fr. Moss, Holy Eucharist, an open discussion period, and time for fellowship and relaxation. There will be morning prayer after breakfast on Sunday. Space is limited so please reserve your place early by sending in the registration below.

# Happenings in the Diocese of Idaho

Anglican Fellowship of Prayer has been a part of the work of the Diocese of Idaho since the Rt. Rev. Don Hulstrand came to Idaho to plant seeds of prayer in our deaneries in the mid 70s.

The first action was Daily Prayer for the Bishops of the Anglican Church around the world at St. Michael's Cathedral in Boise. Juanita Hogg, the A.F.P. Diocesan Representative, wrote a note to each bishop throughout the years of her tenure.

Several years ago the parish prayer representatives again began the practice of praying daily for the bishops of the Anglican communion. Each of our 30 parishes has a prayer representative. They coordinate prayer needs for the diocese as well as prayer vigils, such as the Wave of Prayer for General Convention.

For the past 15 years before the opening of the Diocesan Convention, we have had a Diocesan A.F.P. Prayer Breakfast along with a litany for the work of the Diocese. At this breakfast a person in the Diocese will share his or her personal prayer walk. We have had the bishops, clergy, couples and other faithful laypeople of prayer attend.

As everything cycles so have ways of encouraging all of us to pray: Power House of Prayer, retreats, vigils, labyrinths and centering prayer take place in parishes, deaneries, and retreat centers. We see how prayer continues to work in each of us, encouraging us to deepen our journey in prayer in the many ways of prayer.

For me it is a privilege and a joy to be a part of the Anglican Fellowship of Prayer organization that continues Jesus's call to pray. It calls me back to prayer, to learn and to practice ways of prayer that take me on a closer walk with God.

So I'm looking forward to attending the Fall Biblical Institute on Lectio Divina, Praying the Scriptures. Come join me at ToodHall to take back something new for you to enrich your prayer life, and relationship with God.

# New On The Bookshelf

***Serious Times***, James Emery White, \$13.00. White explores what it means to be in the front lines of what God is doing. When serious times are met with serious lives, the kingdom of God is advanced. Come and discover a life of significance.

***Sacred Rhythms***, Ruth Haley Barton, \$16.00. Picking up on the monastic tradition of creating a "rule of life" that allows for regular space for the practice of spiritual disciplines, Barton's new book takes you more deeply into understanding seven key disciplines and how we can weave them into our daily lives.

***The Da Vinci Question***, James Emery White, \$2.00. Is the Da Vinci Code fact or fiction? White addresses that question with straightforward facts in this timely booklet. White sifts through Dan Brown's claims about Jesus, Mary Magdalene and early Christianity and sets the record straight about what really happened.

***Praying***, J. I. Packer & Carolyn Nystrom, \$18.00. Is praying a duty or a delight? Packer and Nystrom say that it's both: an essential, expected practice as a follower of Christ, but also a privilege and joy. As we start out learning to pray properly, however, the delight often seems to be missing. Here is practical help for active, honest praying that involves all of who we are - heart, hands and head - and moves us to deeper obedience, joy and intimacy with our Father. Includes reflection and study questions, prayer exercises, and journaling suggestions for each chapter and makes an excellent tool for group or personal study.

***The Cross of Christ***, John Stott, \$25.00. From one of the foremost preachers and Christian leaders of our day comes theology at its readable best, a contem-

porary restatement of the meaning of the cross. At the cross Stott finds the majesty and love of God disclosed, the sin and bondage of the world exposed. This book explores all the facets of the cross and its implication for our lives and includes a study guide.

***Ponder These Things***, Praying with Icons of the Virgin, Rowan Williams, \$17.00. Williams invites readers to explore and reflect on the depths of meaning in three classic icons of the Virgin and her Child from the Eastern Christian tradition. Icons have been described as "theology in line and color." In tracing the movement within these icons, The Archbishop of Canterbury discovers the pattern of love that they reveal, a love that invites and embraces us so that we no longer remain as spectators, but find ourselves caught up in the drama that unfolds itself before us.

***Following Francis, The Franciscan Way for Everyone***, Susan Pitchford, \$16.00. Pitchford tells her own story of the franciscan life, as a member of the Third Order, founded by Francis himself so that people from all walks of life can follow the saint's ideal, without leaving their homes or their occupations. Pitchford learned that the Franciscan tradition isn't the exclusive possession of monks cloistered in a monastery, but a spiritual path for ordinary people living in the twenty-first century. Organized around the Rule of St. Francis, this book - a wonderful resource of private devotion or group study - shows readers what it means to live out the Christian life with a Franciscan accent.

***Live, Laugh, and Be Blessed***, Finding Humor and Holiness in Everyday Moments, Anne Bryan Smollin, \$13.00. Wise, funny, common-sense spiritual

direction for the road of life, from a lady who knows that discovering God and humor in our life are facets of the same **diamond. *Live, Laugh, and Be Blessed*** is a keeper!

***Fabric of Faith, A Guide to the Prayer Quilt Ministry***, Kimberly Winston, \$24.00. For countless generations, patchwork quilts have been a visible act of love. Pieced together from bits and pieces of material, they represent the handiwork and devotion of the quilter - and a deep and comforting connection with the person they're presented to. In the Prayers and Squares Ministry, though, the quilt has become something more - a visible act of prayer. It's made not just with artistry but with purpose; not just with fabric but with prayer. From the time the fabric is purchased to the time the finished quilt is given away, a prayer quilt is prayed over by scores of people. from the person who cuts the fabric to the person who inserts the ties. And - most importantly - when the quilt is completed, it's placed before a congregation and every member is invited to bind a tie and say a prayer for the person it will ultimately comfort.

***Waiting in Joyful Hope***, Daily Reflections for Advent and Christmas 2006-2007, Katherine L. Howard, O.S.B. \$3.00. In the hectic weeks before Christmas, it's tough to set aside time for prayer. That's why readers will appreciate this little book of devotions for each day of the Advent and Christmas seasons. With one-page reflections based on seasonal scripture readings, this is great to keep in pocket or purse, to focus a few minutes a day on the coming of the Christ Child into our lives and hearts.
